Baton Rouge and Durban
An Eye-opening Perspective


The numbers show that Baton Rouge, Louisiana has overtaken Atlanta, Georgia as the region that now leads the United States in AIDS cases per capita. AIDS prevention advocates have been working hard to change that, so you can imagine how devastating it was to find out Baton Rouge moved up, not down, in the
rankings. In Baton Rouge, there are 4,851 people with HIV or full-blown AIDS. 82 percent are black, 45 percent are men who have engaged in same sex relationships, many of whom are also IV drug users. Thirty seven percent are women, who got it from men. Most are low income and between 30 and 55 years of age. Now, compare the U.S. leader, which has 4,851 people living with HIV with Durban, the South African leader in AIDS cases per capita. Durban, a city of almost 4 million, has nearly 1 million of its population living with HIV - shocking.

## Earn a Trip to South Africa



The South African Children's Project offers exciting ways to earn a trip to Indawo Yethemba Children's Village in South Africa while raising funds for the project. If you are a marathon runner or a long-distance cyclist, you can earn a round-trip ticket to visit the Graham
family and the grannies and children at their children's village in Ashburton. If you are a runner, the Comrades Ultra Marathon takes place on Sunday June 4, 2017. It is an 89-kilometer (56-miles) race from Durban to Pietermaritzburg. The race route includes our children's village. Recently, two runners earned medals in last year's race while raising nearly $\$ 10,000$. Visit www.comrades.com for more information. If you are a cyclist, the Amashova Durban Classic takes place in October 2017. It is a 106kilometer ( 66 miles) race from Pietermaritzburg to Durban. For more information about the race, visit www.shova.co.za. Basically, the CRP's board of directors has agreed to reimburse a round-trip economy ticket for each $\$ 5,000$ raised for its children's projects in South Africa. Participants are encouraged to plan at least nine days for their trip, which usually includes five to six days at
